A significant portion of these scientists may not be able to safely return to their home countries. As highly skilled individuals with unique expertise and perspectives, they represent a valuable asset to their host countries.

However, opportunities for permanent academic positions can be limited. The private sector, NGOs, and international organizations offer promising alternatives, leveraging their unique skills and experiences. By bringing together diverse stakeholders, these panels aim to identify



opportunities, address challenges, and explore innovative solutions to facilitate the integration of researchers at risk into the broader professional landscape.
